REPORT OF THE RECTOR

The Rev. Dr. Amy E. Richter

Dear Members of St. Anne's Church,

We are the Church in the Circle. This means more than our geographic location in Church Circle in Annapolis. As the Church in the Circle, our mission is to proclaim and celebrate that God's love encompasses all. The good news of God's redeeming love, known in Jesus Christ, is a message of hope for everyone. Our purpose in being the Church in the Circle is to expand the circle of our membership and witness, to welcome more and more people of all ages to know the wideness of God's embrace and mercy, to nurture our members with God's Word and sacraments, and to equip all the baptized to live our lives in service to others. I describe my mission as rector as leading St. Anne's to be theologically informed, spiritually transformed, effectively reaching out as the heart and hands of Jesus Christ, and supported by Christian community. This annual report is full of examples in which these important aspects of our mission are being carried out. I hope you will read it and be encouraged about being part of our parish and the good work God is doing among us and through us.

Here are some of the changes and developments that took place in St. Anne's Church in 2011.

First, we bid farewell to the Rev. Madeleine Beard, deacon, who was called to new service by our bishop. We said goodbye to Carol Sullivan, parish nurse, after she retired (for a second time!) from her ministry at St. Anne's. We also said goodbye to dear parishioners who departed this life, with whom we hope to be reunited in our heavenly home.

We welcomed new staff members who are helping us move forward in our mission. Our search for a talented priest to serve part-time at St. Anne's led us to the Rev. William Bell, MD, BCC (Board Certified Chaplain), who joined us in October. He serves as Assistant Priest for Pastoral Care and Health Ministry and it is a joy to have him as part of our clergy team. We also had Amy Cunningham serve as the Interim Director of PASA, and then welcomed Carrie Grimes as Director of PASA, who has been guiding our Preschool since the fall. With Amy's, and then Carrie's efforts, the relationship between PASA and St. Anne's Parish is more pronounced and positive than it has been in some time.

St. Anne's Church is tremendously blessed by our music staff and choir under the direction of Ernie Green. We strive to offer our very best in worship. Our music is an important part of that excellence at both the 9:30 and 11:15 a.m. Sunday services and on feast days. With the help of Carolene Winter, Laurie Hays, Ken Kimble, Shouvik Mondle, Kari Shea—and the Church Circle Consort, and Jill Woodward, worshippers of all ages are engaged in beautiful music for worship.

Also in our worship life, this year we made the 11:15 a permanent offering, so that we have three Sunday morning Eucharists every week. This brought stability to our attendance, even through most of the summer (except for August, which also challenged us with an earthquake and hurricane). The 11:15 is on break twice a year: on the first Sunday of September for the Parish Picnic, and on the first Sunday of February, when our Annual Meeting is held. The Sycamore Tree (children's Liturgy of the Word) is offered every Sunday, uses a curriculum, and is led by Connie Saeger-Proctor, Jill Woodward and Ken Kimble, and a member of the clergy. In February, we celebrated a joyous confirmation service of 26 young people and adults. On Palm Sunday, we received our bishop's permission to use only the readings and liturgy for Palm Sunday, rather than the

Palm/Passion Sunday pattern and lectionary. This meant that our Holy Week unfolded as a journey, beginning with Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday, through the events of the week, leading through Maundy Thursday and Good Friday, to Easter Sunday. On the Saturday of Easter weekend, we experienced a children's Liturgy of the Light, an Easter Vigil for children in which more than 100 children and their family members participated, followed by the Easter egg hunt. Our Easter Day services were full, as were our Christmas Eve services.


Since worship is the most important thing we do as a parish church, it is wonderful that we worship well—and not just on Sunday mornings. Our faithful Evening Prayer leaders continue to offer the prayers of the church almost every night of the year, and our Tuesday 12:10 p.m., and Wednesday 8:00 a.m. Eucharists continue to have small, but faithful congregations of familiar faces and visitors.

I am grateful to all of the members of St. Anne's Church Staff – those named above and Rebecca Black, Kirsten Hair, Ginny Hustvedt, Mark LaBuda, Peppy Lee, Ben Mitchell, the Rev. Joseph S. Pagano and Connie Saeger-Proctor. Thank you also to Mary K Parkinson for tending our archives, and Shaila and Lucky Sachdeva who staff our nursery. They all work hard to support the ministries of our church. We are further blessed by the voluntary ministry of three clergy who are retired from previous assignments: the Rev. John Kenny, deacon, who assists in worship, including the Sycamore Tree; the Rev. Richardson Libby, who assists in worship, including the Sycamore Tree, officiates weddings, covers for emergencies requiring a priest, and with Mrs. Kathryn Libby, offered guidance and teaching about prayer during our Wednesday Lenten series; and the Rev. John Smith, who assists with weddings, covers in emergencies and, along with Mrs. Sue Smith, are faithful participants in the life of St. Anne's Church. We are also grateful for the participation of two more retired clergy and their wives, the Rt. Rev. Michael Creighton and Betty Creighton, and the Rev. Dr. Gid Montjoy and Cynthia Montjoy.

I am grateful for all the ways lay members serve and support our ministry efforts at St. Anne's Church. It is not possible here to thank by name all of those whose time and talent make it possible for us to live into the mission God sets before us.

Thank you for the opportunity to serve as rector of St. Anne's Church.

CHRISTIAN FORMATION FOR ADULTS

BibLit pairs biblical texts with great American short stories, the literary works serving as a lens through which to explore scripture. The seminar is in its fourth year, and with class membership growing from year to year, the class is now closed to new membership; this decision was necessary to preserve the open exchange of

ideas around the seminar table. BibLit scripture readings have ranged throughout the Hebrew and Christian testaments and, as a class, we have grown in both scriptural familiarity and understanding. We have now exhausted eight anthologies of American Short Story, and in January turned to anthologies of four authors: John Cheever, Flannery O'Connor, Isaac Bashevis Singer and William Faulkner.

Education for Ministry (EfM)

EfM is a distance-learning program of the School of Theology of the University of the South in Sewanee, Tennessee. Completion of the program takes four years, during which participants study the Bible, Church history, and twentieth century theology. Participants commit one year at a time to meet regularly in seminars led by a trained mentor. EfM provides a comprehensive, experiential education in the foundations and messages of our Christian faith.

The seminar group is the nucleus of the Education for Ministry program. A group consists of six to twelve participants and a trained mentor meeting weekly over the course of a nine-month academic year. These meetings are usually two and a half to three hours in length. Through study, prayer, and reflection, we move toward a new understanding of the fullness of God's kingdom. We spend between two and four hours in study and preparation each week. In the seminars, members have an opportunity to share their insights and discoveries, as well as to discuss questions, which the study materials raise for them.

More importantly we develop skills in theological reflection. The goal is to learn to think theologically. By examining our own beliefs and their relationship to our culture and the tradition of our Christian faith, we can learn what it means to be effective ministers in the world. In coming to terms with the notion that everything we do has the potential for manifesting the love of Christ, we discover that our ministry is at hand wherever we turn.

EfM has been a part of the adult education program at St. Anne's for many years. A group that meets weekly on Monday mornings began in October 2011. We are recruiting those interested in this kind of serious religious study and would like to offer a group that would meet on a weekday evening. - Otherwise sustained ourselves in community as the oldest continuously operating lay-led ministry at St. Anne's—our 18th year as of Eastertide 2012!

We also:

- Completed Luke's *Acts of the Apostles* and embarked on the study of Paul's letters.
- Welcomed a new regularly-attending member following Joe's introduction of Paul to us at a mid-October Huddle.
- Welcomed back a regularly-attending long-term member who was temporarily sidelined.
- Are soon planning to devote some time to listening and discussing a recent lecture, "Do Christians and Muslims Worship the Same God?" by Yale Divinity theologian Miroslav Volf.

Game-changing faith benefits from team-work and regular-scheduled practices.

On behalf of the Huddle, all men of St. Anne's are welcome to visit one Saturday morning for a good breakfast, fellowship and earnest discussions, sprinkled with levity, of our faith journeys.

Sunday Forum

Ernest Green, has also graced the Forum podium, packing the room. Our Rector, Amy Richter, PhD, and Associate Rector, Joseph Pagano, PhD, continue to be among our most popular speakers. We have been very fortunate in the rotating teams of parishioners who have provided wonderful hospitality for the Forum.

Other Christian Formation for Adults

A Bible Study on Tuesday afternoons was also offered by the Rev. Dr. Amy Richter. The group finished the Gospel according to Matthew in the spring, and began the Gospel according to Luke in the fall.

Children's Formation and Ministry

Children's Sunday Discovery:

Children between the ages of 3 years old and the 5th grade gathered from 11:15 a.m. to 12:15 p.m. With an aim of expanding our lessons and developmental accessibility, new materials were purchased and new lessons were implemented for all age groups. The changes are part of a larger plan to build a three-year cycle for each age group that allows children to develop a deeper and broader spiritual foundation that builds from year to year. Focus units were again offered and included: Eucharist, prayer, service (including Trees for Haiti), the Bible and sacred stories, and seasonal festal celebrations.

The Sycamore Tree (Children's Liturgy):

This year a program was purchased and the Children's Liturgy moved into a deeper liturgical rhythm. Each week one of St. Anne's clergy and a lay leader offer a lesson, read the Gospel, and lead the children in prayers. A prayer box was made for the children to place their written or artistic prayers, and the box is processed at the offering. Jill Woodward has expanded the music offerings and with the assistance of Ken Kimble, children are learning many new songs.

Children's Choir:

The children continue to sing the offertory at the 9:30 a.m. service on the 4th Sunday of the month. Practices are again held each Sunday in the Skylight Room. This year we began to teach and practice the offertory song in the Sycamore Tree. The children's choir also offered music at the Children's Liturgy of the Light and the Christ Child Christmas Eve Service.

Vacation Bible School:

In July, St. Anne's and First Presbyterian Church partnered to offer a week-long Vacation Bible School to children in the area congregations and the community. After many years of First Presbyterian hosting VBS, St. Anne's stepped up and hosted the week-long program. The theme was Clean Water for All God's Children. More than 50 volunteers helped provide the program, including 25 middle and high school Jr. Counselors. Seventy children attended VBS.

Child Care in the Nursery:

Child care is offered every Sunday from 9:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Child care was also offered on Tuesday during the Healing Eucharist and other special liturgies during the year. This year we offered online registration. Children are cared for and supervised by Shaila and Lucky Sachdeva.

Baptism Ministry:

The Baptism Workshop is offered to parents, families, sponsors and Godparents on the Saturday before the Baptism. This year the workshop was reconfigured to include two reflections on Baptism, including a child-friendly presentation on the Symbols of Baptism and an in-depth presentation on Baptism and the history and a full rehearsal with clergy and volunteers. A dedicated and generous team of volunteers help with serving

refreshments, banner making, and rehearsal. Another team of talented and generous volunteers make baptismal blankets for each child and handmade woven bookmarks for adults being baptized.

Family Events:

This year, St. Anne's offered three family events:

- An Advent Family Night in which Advent wreathes and four Advent crafts were made.
- Children's Liturgy of the Light followed by an Egg Hunt on the Saturday before Easter.
- Christ Child Christmas Eve liturgy, in which the children lead the liturgy of the word and the children's choir provided music.

Volunteer Thanks:

Many thanks to all the volunteers who helped shape children's ministry by teaching, assisting, providing snacks, making materials, and supporting our children. Special thanks to the teachers who are dedicated to journeying with our children each week and who also spend time training and preparing for the lessons and presentations.

Young People's Formation and Ministry

Confirmation Class:

In 2011, 23 young people completed confirmation class. Confirmands went on a weekend retreat in Northeast Maryland and reflected on Christian life and fellowship. Many thanks to the mentors who guided and supported the young people.

Youth Ministry:

Young people engaged in Christian life and developed a sense of belonging in many ways in 2011. Five high school students attended the Episcopal Youth Event with 1,500 young people. Four went to Guatemala with Partners in Mission in Guatemala, and one went to Honduras with the Episcopal Diocese of Maryland. In our local community, young people engaged in community service at the Stanton Center, Light House homeless shelter, Vacation Bible School, the Backpack Ministry, gifts for Clay Street, and food collection.

Within the ministry at St. Anne's, young people preached at all three services, shared their mission ministry experiences and learnings at the Adult Forum, and served as Jr. Counselors at Vacation Bible School. Young people served as chalice bearers, lectors, acolytes, prayer of the people leaders, and assisted in the Sycamore Tree and Children's Sunday Discovery. Young people were narrators for the Christ Child Christmas Eve service and readers for the Liturgy of the Light children's service.

Sunday Mornings for Youth is offered to all young people, but primarily middle school youth attended. The Sunday morning time is led by a dedicated team who offer a variety of topics for discussion, games, and service.

First Sunday's for Youth is a once-a-month evening activity for middle and high school young people. Youth served at a steak dinner at Winter Relief, went to the Goodwill and purchased warm clothing for homeless, went ice skating, took a trip to the mall to discover what is it like to shop with less money, helped with the Easter Basket project, and gathered to enjoy pizza and games.

Many thanks to the adults who journey each week with our young people by giving their time and sharing their gifts. Our young people's lives are enriched by your presence and faithful leadership.

ENVIRONMENTAL MINISTRY

This year the Environmental Ministry continued many of the programs which were started over the past several years. Our annual plant sale helped us to keep our request for funds from the vestry quite low. The replacement of light bulbs for both the parish house and the church continued this year and will result in a savings to the church on electricity cost. By replacing the old incandescent bulbs with more energy efficient bulbs, not only will the lighting be more efficient, but the air conditioners will not have to work so hard to offset the heat produced by the old bulbs. The work on the rain gardens at the parish house has been completed. Our final report was submitted this summer to the Chesapeake Bay Trust, which had given us our grant money. Our final obligation was met when we installed a sign this fall describing the purpose for and installation process of the gardens. With the small amount of remaining money, we will be ordering plant markers for the gardens so that parishioners may identify the native plants that have been placed in them.

We have continued to be involved with the Chesapeake Interfaith Environmental Group (CIEG) by helping to plan and execute the *Earth, Water and Faith Festival* at the Annapolis Towne Centre at Parole to celebrate Earth Day, 2011. This event featured musical groups, including our St. Anne's Church Circle Consort, readings and prayers for our environment, displays and activities highlighting best environmental practices, and various recycling venues. As the year progressed, some of our ministry members continued to meet regularly with the CIEG group to work on our Earth Day event for 2012 and to help plan and sponsor several other events in early 2012

Finally, the environmental ministry embarked on several recycling campaigns, including eye glasses, rechargeable batteries and cell phones. We are currently looking into setting up a recycling center for wine corks at the parish house.

Foyer Groups

Introduced to St. Anne's about thirteen years ago, the Foyer Group continues to be a vibrant part of the community life of the parish. Its purpose has been to promote fellowship among parishioners—young, middle-aged, retired, singles, couples, families, newcomers, and long-standing members—and to encourage the informal exchange of ideas, experiences and problems within friendly home surroundings and in a Christian context.

More than 100 people are participating in the Foyer Groups this year. Our initial event was a potluck supper held in the parish hall for about 70 enthusiastic parishioners. From that gathering, we identified group leaders and assigned people to 10 small groups. The groups are changed each year in order to promote new friendships. Each group consists of 10 to 12 individuals who meet six or seven times between October and June. The meetings include a communal meal, but the format is flexible. The members within each group decide what they will do at their gatherings and take turns acting as hosts.

In 2006, we introduced several large group events for all the Foyer participants to get together and extend their relationships within St. Anne's. These events (at Christmas and in early June) have been met with great enthusiasm. In June, there was a picnic on the lawn at St. Anne's Church, and in December, Joyce and Bob Nay opened their lovely home for our Christmas event.

We still welcome new participants, particularly newcomers to our church.

Thank you to group leaders: Eleanor and David Huggins, Monica and Bill Barry, Eleanor and Bruce Krause, Judy and Bob Olson, Ryta and Peter Seremet, Linda and Bill Silva, and Anne and Jim Ziegler. In addition to the aforementioned group leaders, the three chairpersons also were group leaders: Betty and Mike Creighton, Carol Weichert, and Dick Krimm.

Facilities Committee

The year started fairly uneventful with initial new landscaping at the church after successful installation of the new driveway last year. Then, under the Vestry's direction, the committee moved forward to get our exterior lighting at the church underway with selection of a lighting designer. Little did we know that we would receive a double whammy with the earthquake on August 23rd and shortly thereafter the approach of Hurricane Irene. Fortunately, while we received some damage from the earthquake, none of it appears structurally significant and there were no resulting roof leaks from Irene. Repairs to the damage will begin soon to get it accomplished before Easter this year.

Exterior lighting moves forward with the firm of George Sexton and Associates providing design plans. We plan to get the project approved through the City, and after some fundraising this spring, have installation late spring or early summer.

The PASA restrooms were renovated this summer and the first floor parish house restrooms are currently being renovated. In the meantime, we wrestled with water leaking into the basement (affectionately referred

to by the high school students as the “dungeon”) of the Old Rectory. Resolving this took some ‘sleuthing’ and it has finally abated; we will begin cleanup and repairs soon.

Two special thanks go out. David Ford and his wife, Jeanine, spearheaded and paid for the restoration of the outside South Street entry light at the church. Fortunately, this historic light was salvageable, and now looks superb. A second thank you goes to Avery Groft and his father, Eric, for helping to re-lamp the faces of the town clock in the steeple. It takes a young and agile person to wrangle your way around the supports and reach the lights behind the clock face. Avery was super (and had a thrill climbing into the steeple).

Thank you very much to the committee members, Randy Brown, Harry Jones, and Lisa Sherwood, and with support from Eric Groft, and to those others who volunteered this year.

Cemetery Committee

The Cemetery Committee is responsible for the operation, management and financial aspects of St. Anne's Cemetery. The committee acts under the authority of the Rector and Vestry to keep the cemetery running and in good condition. They also represent the cemetery in the community for St. Anne's Church.

There were a total of 19 burials in 2011: 5 cremations and 14 full burials. Not all of these had funeral services at St. Anne's, however.

The cemetery is responsible for a considerable intake and expenditure of funds during the year. For 2011 the income totaled \$58,615.12 and the expenses totaled \$77,712.50 producing a net loss of \$19,097.38.

Grass cutting cost (\$32,755.46) with payroll, pension and benefits totaling \$38,462.11. Income from burials was \$17,140, and the sale of burial sites totaled \$8,700. Interest (\$28,247.52) from the cemetery endowment funds is also used to support cemetery expenses. Income from annual care fees totaled \$200.

Burial sites are available, and Mark LaBuda, our cemetery manager, will be glad to show them to you. There are sites for full burials and cremations. Mark can be reached at 410-267-7184.

Many calls are received during the year regarding burial records. These we try to handle as well as possible, but our burial records for long ago are scanty; and even if the record is available, the actual location of the grave may not be known. All of the early parish records were transferred to the Maryland State Archives, but many have been copied and published. There are three printed sources that are useful:

1. "Cemetery Inscriptions of Anne Arundel County Maryland, Volume 1," transcribed and published by the Anne Arundel Genealogical Society in 1982. It is indexed and St. Anne's Cemetery covers pages 88 to 175.
2. "Anne Arundel County Church Records of the 17th and 18th Centuries," by F. Edward Wright, published in 1994. St. Anne's records cover pages 65 to 106 and include births, baptisms, marriages, deaths and burials. It is indexed and is a compilation from church records at the Maryland State Archives.

3. Many times, information can be found in the two large red volumes of "Annapolis Maryland Families," by Robert H. McIntire, published in 1979 and 1989. Cemetery records are not included, but family relationships and death dates can be found.

Memorials Committee

HEALTH MINISTRY

Health Ministry

The Reverend William R. Bell, MD, BCC

The pastoral ministry of St Anne's suffered both loss and gain in 2011. The longtime parish nurse, Carol Sullivan, retired on December 15. Her particular skills and experience are irreplaceable. In October, however, I began working as an assistant priest for pastoral care and health ministry. Carol worked with me for two months to transfer some of her wisdom and memories to me. My skills and training overlap with Carol's, but my duties will bring a different focus. While maintaining the ministry, my intent is to deepen the spiritual and emotional care of parishioners.

The backbone of pastoral ministry is visiting with sick, disabled and shut-in persons. This occurs in homes, hospitals, retirement communities and nursing facilities. Lay and clerical visitors minister comfort, sacramental care, and a listening presence. Lay visitors visit Anne Arundel Medical Center five days a week. Ginger Cove, the Chase Home, and specific homebound persons also receive regular visits on at least a monthly basis. The Pastoral Care Team meets at Ginger Cove on the second Wednesday of each month for education, mutual support and communication.

We also provide educational and physical services for the care and health of the congregation. Deborah Houghton oversees the prayer shawl ministry. This team has made and given over one hundred prayer shawls. Parishioners knit the shawls and blankets that bring comfort to new moms and Baptismal candidates, as well as those suffering loss or illness. Similar lay-led ministries provide blood pressure checks, transportation assistance, food, and prayer. Other practical services include relaxation CDs, the back door reading leaflets, cell phones and information for domestic violence prevention, eye glasses for Guatemala, and parish blood drives.

St Anne's has more than 230 members over the age of 70. This alone suggests the potential need for comfort and care within this community of Christ. The ministry requires effort, organization and communication among parishioners and staff alike. As the new year begins, my focus is on the training, support, and care of our many caregivers.

Outreach Committee

St. Anne's Outreach Committee was established in January 2010 at the direction of the Rector to review outreach requests, to help facilitate existing outreach efforts and to ensure the Parish's outreach ministries are consistent with the mission of the Parish.

The Committee's first task during this inaugural year was the development of guidelines to define the types of projects that St. Anne's will support and procedures to guide the Committee in the performance of its duties.

These guidelines state that outreach projects considered by St. Anne's must:

- be visible to the church and community;
- include hands-on participation by St. Anne's parishioners;
- result in positive change to the recipient(s); and
- provide creative and substantive approaches to emerging or critical needs.

The Outreach Committee considered seven new proposals in 2011 suggested by parishioners, and approved five. These new projects include three fundraisers by several young members of the Parish to assist others in need. St. Anne's School student, Alex Marsden, collected Legos and books for the children of families who move into Habitat for Humanity homes. James Biddle, Peter Doley, Sophie Evans and Mary Purnell joined Partners in Mission in Guatemala and helped fund their trip with fundraising nights at two local restaurants (Chevy's and California Tortilla Kitchen). In November, Brooke Lucas collected nearly 2,000 T-shirts that will be delivered to those in need through the Episcopal Church in Honduras. Other new programs approved by the Committee in 2011 include Backpack Buddies, which provides weekend backpacks filled with healthy meals and snacks for at-risk children at Annapolis Elementary School, and the Employment Assistance Program to assist parishioners who may be out of work or underemployed.

During the first year of committee operation, new outreach projects approved by the Committee were limited to those submitted by parishioners. The expectation is that the Committee will begin to consider projects from outside the parish in 2012.

In 2011, St. Anne's Parish stepped forward with enthusiasm and generosity to support outreach programs with more than \$103,000 and literally many thousands of hours of time and talent, both of which demonstrate a true Christian spirit and calling to serve God.

The Outreach Committee allocated \$70,117 to the following existing Parish outreach ministries based on the budget approved by the Vestry.

- Annapolis Area Ministries/Light House
- Back to School Backpack Program
- Easter Basket Outreach

- Friends of Clay Street
- Habitat for Humanity
- Partners in Mission/Guatemala
- Winter Relief for the Homeless
- Backpack Buddies

St. Anne's parishioners provided an additional estimated \$33,000 to support the following programs (all totals are estimates):

- Backpacks – \$7,000
- Easter Baskets -- \$10,000
- September stocking the Light House pantry -- \$2,000
- Winter Relief Program Christmas cards and food preparation -- \$2,000
- Christmas for Clay Street – \$7,000
- Light House meals - \$1,000
- Stoves for Guatemala - \$4,000

St. Anne's has a strong tradition of outreach work carried out by very dedicated parishioners and for this we are sincerely thankful.

The Committee is grateful to Bill Garrett and Tad Wood for their service as members in 2011. Continuing committee membership into 2012 are Karen Davis, Cindy Hartman, Katherine Hilton, Bill Malicki (Chairman), Townsend McNitt, Charlotte Pennington, Phil Reynolds and newly inducted Clay Richards and Bill Silva.

Annapolis Area Ministries, Inc.

St. Anne's initially began what is now known as the Light House shelter and served as host church to many community individuals in need of shelter. Today, the Annapolis Area Ministries, Inc. (AAMI) Board provides oversight essential to operate a thriving shelter. AAMI is a cooperative, inter-faith organization that serves people in need in the Anne Arundel County area, working in conjunction with other agencies and area ministries of its member congregations. Our St. Anne's liaison on the AAMI Board is Rebecca Black, and Elizabeth Kinney now serves as Executive Director of the Light House.

The new Light House opened its doors to serve the homeless on October 19, 2010. Many thanks to all of you at St. Anne's for your efforts (contributions and talents) in making our new Light House homeless shelter a reality for 30 men, 15 women and 5 families. This magnificent new Homeless Prevention Support Center is located at 10 Hudson Street in Annapolis at Parole, nearby many job opportunities for these folks that seek healing and a sincere desire to regain independence. From the many volunteer efforts in administrative support, fund raising, meal preparation, mental health counseling, staffing support, and stocking the pantry, the shelter is able to thrive and those individuals that are served can once again have the hope and the love and support of our community to carry forward in their life's journey.

In November 2011, the former shelter at 206 West Street was reopened to serve the homeless population that are not able to commit to the more formalized program offered at the Light House, and instead choose shelter on a daily availability basis. The Staunton Center formerly provided this services which is now under the leadership of the Light House.

The Annapolis Area Ministries Board provides oversight essential to operate the Light House and is comprised of 15 area churches that serve as we do at St. Anne's to fulfill these outreach ministries in support of homeless prevention. While the Friends of the Light House Shelter Board serve in a fundraising capacity to meet the financial needs essential to this ministry. Many St. Anne parishioners volunteer in support of these fundraising activities:

Back to School Backpack Program

St. Anne's parishioners donated backpacks, money and school supplies to enable over 100 needy children at Mills-Parole Elementary School to begin the school year with all of the tools necessary to ensure success in learning. These children will now be able to hold their heads high as they carry their school supplies in backpacks of all colors and design. Leslie Tiffany, the school guidance counselor, said it was truly a sight to see when the children's faces lit up with joy and excitement when they were presented with the backpacks that so many generous people provided for them. St. Anne's is blessed to have members with giving hearts and concern for God's children in our community.

Ginny Hustvedt's superb organization, thoughtful dedication to detail and excellent communication got the project started. She did a fantastic job of coordinating with the Department of Social Services to procure the names of children who signed up for assistance and prepared the name tags, bulletin board and sign-up sheets.

The Committee of Adrienne Sheldon, Jane Brunt, Gid and Cindy Montjoy then took charge and staffed the bulletin board before and after Sunday services and collected the backpacks from church and the parish house to ensure delivery to a very grateful Mills-Parole Elementary School. The project was completed when Gid, Jeanne and Bill, ably assisted by Leslie, carried the backpacks into the school from our SUV's, the week before start of school.

Everyone is congratulated for an outstanding effort.

Backpack Buddies

The Backpack Buddies program is a new ministry started in December, 2011 by St. Anne's parishioners and volunteers from local churches and the community. This program provides 50 Annapolis Elementary School (AES) students at risk of going hungry when school is not in session with weekend meals and snacks during the

school year. Each week, volunteers help collect and pack backpacks with kid-friendly non-perishable food. The children receive these backpacks containing six balanced meals and two healthy snacks at the end of every week. The children are selected by the school principal and guidance counselor and include many of the same children that St. Anne's serves through Clay Street Ministries.

Backpack Buddies is a nationwide program. In Annapolis, the program is also found at Tyler Heights Elementary School, Georgetown East Elementary School, and Mills Parole Elementary School.

Many of the children served come from single parent families who struggle to make ends meet. A number of them rely on the cafeteria at AES to feed them breakfast and lunch every day. And for too many of these children, they have very little food once they leave school. Weekends and holidays are a real problem for these students as they lose a primary food source, the school cafeteria. The weekly backpacks meet the nutritional needs of the children on the weekend and help ensure that they come to school on Monday able to learn. In addition to meeting the children's nutritional needs, each child has a sponsor who sends them notes and small gifts throughout the year to encourage them.

The total cost of this program for the year is \$15,750. We have received funding from many St. Anne's parishioners and other individuals and two large donations from the Naval Academy Chapel (Catholic parish) and 1st Presbyterian Church. We have also partnered with the Maryland Food Bank for more affordable food.

The families and children participating in this program have told the school how happy they are to be in this program and what a difference it is making for their family.

Clay Street Partnership

The relationship with the Stanton Community Center, Head Start and the Clay Street neighbors has evolved from a group praying for the city at the Stanton Center into a strong relationship of working together for the good of that community and of the children, youth and their families in particular. Our St Anne's community has truly been embraced as partners.

- Christmas Gift Giving - The Christmas giving of gifts for the children who attend the homework club is a great sharing from the hearts of the people of St. Anne's. Sixty-nine children from thirty-nine families received gifts in addition to four other families from the Stanton Center who were in need of gifts. Katie Harris and Sylvia Lohr beautifully organize this effort with six other volunteers along with Teresa Jenkins from Annapolis Elementary School. A personal dimension of this gift giving is the prayer card with the name of the child given to each giver with the request that they pray for the child during the year. On the day the gifts are given, the parents are invited for a gathering at the Center for a sharing of the Christmas Story by their children, a prayer for the families and refreshments.
- Head Start Summer Camp - This camp is a six-week program funded by St Anne's for five year olds to help prepare them for Kindergarten. It is a program that cannot be funded through Head Start, as it is a supplement to their budget. It was identified by the neighborhood as a huge need, and has been endorsed by the Kindergarten teachers at Annapolis Elementary School. The cost of this camp is \$5,000, which covers teachers' salaries and field trips. Our Teen Camp, as well as several St. Anne's teenagers, volunteer, and are able experience the richness of the program.

- Homework Club - This afterschool program is led and coordinated by Sharon McElfish from St Anne's, and Archie Trader and Lassie Belt, Stanton Center Staff. There are 51 children registered for study groups Monday through Thursday from 3:15 to 5:00 p.m. or later, if needed. There are 38 volunteers with 23 from St Anne's. The emphasis is on doing homework, including math facts, reading help, and organization; a desire to learn and do well; good behavior; respect; attending school every day and being a loving, encouraging presence in their lives. Birthday celebrations occur monthly with a prayer for each child, a delicious birthday cake, and fun crafts, a gift from Elizabeth Reid. Honor roll students and those with perfect attendance are rewarded with a dinner out with Mr. Belt. There is regular contact with the children's teachers through Sharon McElfish. The students are primarily from Annapolis Elementary and Middle Schools, Bates Middle School, and West Annapolis Elementary School.
- Teen Camp - The Teen Camp is a partnership with the Stanton Center. The counselor is funded by St Anne's; activities are funded through generous grants from Annapolis Rotary, the USNA Chapel and the Mark 10:14 Foundation, which provides its van. In 2011, 33 St. Anne's parish members, along with 23 people from the Annapolis community, were involved in some capacity with the program. Lunches were prepared by members of the parish, including some who hosted the camp at their homes or pools. Activities were designed to educate, expand their vision, and encourage good decision making; build confidence and a sense of purpose in their lives; and respect for each other. Encouraging an open heart to the love and presence of Jesus was an integral part of life together for the five weeks and throughout the year. Serving and caring for others was demonstrated through their volunteer work.

Easter Basket Ministry

The joy in Christ's resurrection can be difficult to experience fully when hunger shadows a family. Due to continuing unemployment, scarcity of jobs, rising costs and high cost of living, many hard working families in the greater Annapolis area are finding it hard to make ends meet. After paying housing, energy and transportation bills, hundreds of families are sometimes unable to put food on their table. Our social services partners report that children in these households sometimes go to bed hungry and wonder if there would be food in the house tomorrow.

St. Anne's Easter Baskets to Feed the Hungry program is designed to assist needy families struggling with hunger during the joyful Easter season. Food Link, an award-winning social services organization, identifies deserving families and, during Lent 2011, St. Anne's parishioners stepped forward to alleviate their hunger. Donors were encouraged to provide at least three meals for Easter Day to the anonymous family they chose. Generous donors turned 138 plastic laundry baskets provided by St. Anne's Parish into Easter Baskets—many gaily decorated—filled with food, clothing, gift cards, stuffed bunnies and even pots of cheerful spring flowers. These baskets were distributed during Easter Week to more than 100 needy families in Annapolis and surrounding communities.

Many parishioners commented that choosing a needy family, shopping for their needs and preparing their baskets was a fun, rewarding family activity. The Parish received dozens of calls and letters from the grateful (sometimes tearful) recipients of St. Anne's generosity.

St. Anne's Easter Basket program has become a broad-based Parish effort made possible by more than thirty-five energetic, hard-working volunteers.

Family Cooking for the Light House

This year we moved from a time of getting acquainted with the new kitchen and the greater numbers of dinner guests to a time of great abundance with many hands working together on any one evening! We have enjoyed making new friends as our community has welcomed the addition of six new families and many friends of families coming to help.

We meet on the third Monday of each month and gather in the kitchen of the Light House shelter to prepare dinner for 60 clients. After cooking a menu planned and purchased by one or more families and geared for preparation by children and adults alike, we ready the serving line for dinner. The more hands helping the better, allowing individuals of all ages to take part in preparing the meal, and creating table decorations or activities for children to share. At 6:00 p.m. sharp we all join hands in a circle of prayer. After serving the meal we, too, sit down to dinner. Over the year, this small and growing community of both St. Anne's parishioners and friends of St. Anne's included 12 families with a total of 42 people participating in the project.

A glimpse of our time together from several family members: "I spent some time just watching the volunteers who were all smiles. The entire evening was just filled with God's love and compassion." "I saw God in the wonder of the young volunteer children's faces that were experiencing charity work and homelessness for the first time. One child remarked: 'It felt good to help others and I want to do it again'." "I saw God in the camaraderie of all those working in the kitchen and in those we served when they thanked us for what we had contributed. Their genuine appreciation and warmth was God. Mostly I felt God everywhere."

Habitat for Humanity of the Chesapeake

Habitat for Humanity of the Chesapeake is a non-profit, Christian ministry which works in partnership with people from all walks of life to provide, through new construction or renovation, simple, decent and affordable housing for low-income families in Anne Arundel and Baltimore counties. For the past several years, St. Anne's has participated as the anchor church in the Annapolis Interfaith Coalition. This is a group of eight Christian, Islamic and Jewish faith partners who worked together with other coalitions to sponsor and build ten houses on Clay Street in Annapolis. As a member of the Interfaith Coalition, St. Anne's gave \$25,000 toward the \$100,000 that each coalition raised to sponsor a house. We also provided volunteers who worked many hours over the past year on the actual building of the houses, as well as providing lunches to the volunteers at the build site. By our commitment to Habitat, we are helping needy families by building affordable and decent houses, which will contribute to the improvement of the community and also provide stability and pride of ownership to families who would not otherwise be able to afford a home of their own. Although the Clay St. project is now complete, we hope to continue our involvement with Habitat for Humanity as more properties become available in 2012.

KAIROS Prison Ministry

St. Anne's Parish supports this ecumenical ministry in several ways. Some parishioners write letters to inmates (in the past three years we've sent more than a thousand letters to prisoners in Maryland). Others have volunteered to go into prisons on weekend programs (including the women's prison at Jessup). Others contribute money, and in the past, baked cookies for the weekend programs (Maryland prisons no longer accept homemade cookies, alas). KAIROS Outside is a program for women whose husband, son or father is incarcerated. This year teams are forming for all of the above, plus new weekend programs are being planned for prisons in Maryland and in Delaware.

Partners in Mission in Guatemala

This year was again highlighted by the August trip to Guatemala during which we had four youths (Peter Doley, Mary Purnell, Sophie Evans and James Biddle from St. Anne's) and four adults (Wayne Adamson, Kevin Hays, Clare Fisher, and Amina Ferreira) spend several days visiting communities and local schools and viewing progress on the wood stove project. For Peter, Mary and Sophie, this was their second trip to Guatemala. The adult newcomer in 2011 was Amina Ferreira, daughter-in-law of Linda and Wayne Adamson. Amina, who is originally from Brazil, was a very welcome addition because she served as our translator for the trip. While in Guatemala, we made the decision to begin installing wood stoves in yet another local community that we have been working with: Las Trampas. The total number of stoves supplied now exceeds 200 and represents St. Anne's and other donations totaling over \$20,000. We were able to complete the stove project in Chucalibal II in 2011 thanks to the special effort of Peter Doley who personally collected \$2,000 in donations from friends and relatives. Thanks Peter!!

Our other special emphasis this year was the Internet and computers. We visited an Internet café close to Chujulimul and looked at a possible site for starting a café within the community of Chujulimul itself. No decisions were made on a separate Internet installation; we are exploring the idea of providing separate funding to students for Internet use at the nearby Internet café during the 2012 school year.

Our health training program continued again this year as did the scholarship program. We had about 80 elementary students, 12 junior high and 10 high school students who received scholarships from PIM. This year we only had one high school graduate, but we did have the **very first college graduate** from the community. She had previously received some scholarship money from St. Anne's earlier in her educational program. Also, the PIM committee made a donation to the community of \$4,000 to help them complete their new elementary school building.

Stocking the Light House Pantry

We had a wonderful response to our September food collection for the Light House pantry. This was our 16th year of collecting in September. We took to the shelter the 78 bags of food and supplies that were brought to church. The total count is considerably higher because a number of parishioners took their donations directly to the shelter. In addition, \$585 was collected and we have been using that money all fall and into winter to help fill the pantry shelves at the shelter at 10 Hudson Street.

Winter Relief and Mental Health Needs for the Homeless

In 2011, we joined 60 Annapolis area churches by providing temporary shelter during the winter months to the homeless that could not otherwise find shelter. This program is known as Winter Relief and is organized by Anne Arundel House of Hope in Glen Burnie where the homeless congregate for intake and where their day program is housed. We also provided mental health services to the guests at the Light House homeless shelter during 2011 and ran a Wednesday evening group to facilitate goal attainment by the guests who strive for jobs, housing, health care, and many other needs associated with independent living.

Winter Relief Outreach Ministry: Last year 40+ volunteers from St. Anne's joined First Presbyterian Church during the third week of February to provide temporary shelter to homeless individuals. Approximately 60 churches participate by hosting or sponsoring this temporary shelter for one-week periods serving 65+ homeless men and women during the coldest of months. St. Anne's served with First Presbyterian volunteers to provide meals, serve as night monitors, perform laundry needs, escort guests to showering facilities, serve at the help-desk, transport daily to and from the Anne Arundel House of Hope Resource Center, serve on teams to set up and break down services, and secure wish list items for the temporary shelter guests. Volunteers play a significant role in the lives of these chronically homeless individuals that are not currently being served in any formalized program and yet find themselves in desperate survival needs.

PASA offers an enriched Christian-based preschool program with a dual emphasis in traditional preschool pre-academics and the arts. The Preschool's program offers morning programs for children ages 2-5 in a nurturing environment. PASA enrolls 100 children from 82 families—78 percent of our students hail from Annapolis, with the remainder living in adjacent towns such as Arnold, Crownsville, and Edgewater. The Preschool prides itself on its close-knit community, its historic downtown location, and its exceptional facility.

The arts program at PASA is its hallmark. Along with traditional classroom time, all students spend time each week in the art studio and the music room under the instruction of our art and music teachers. Art classes incorporate a wide array of media, from clay to papier maché to pastels and tempera paints. Students are exposed to a basic foundation in which they learn about master artists and a variety of techniques in creating art. The school year culminates in a Fine Arts Night, at which art work from each student is on display throughout the campus. Music classes incorporate song, dance, and age-appropriate instruments. Students perform throughout the year in a variety of venues including the book fair, Christmas Pageant, and Fine Arts Night. Students also attend movement classes with a special instructor each week, engaging in yoga, dance,

obstacle courses, and other age-appropriate forms of gross motor development. A day at PASA is stimulating and fun-filled.

The Preschool's pre-kindergarten program is consistently recognized by local elementary schools for preparing children well for kindergarten. PASA employs a part-time Instructional Specialist who designs and implements a robust pre-reading curriculum. This curriculum begins in September of the pre-kindergarten year and evolves month to month.

PASA hosts a variety of special events throughout the year including a Fall Fest in the Churchyard, an all-school Thanksgiving Feast, a Halloween Parish Hall parade, a Mother's Day Tea Party, a Woodworking with Dads Day, and various holiday parties. In an effort to reach out to our community, PASA also hosts a mitten tree drive for The Light House shelter, a canned food drive for Annapolis Food Link, and a book drive to support the Head Start Program.

PASA is fortunate to have a very active Parent Teacher Organization that fundraises throughout the year in order to support school programs, enrichment events and facilities. The fundraising efforts of the PASA PTO have resulted in the school's ability to purchase a wonderful new playground which will be installed in the summer of 2012. The PTO raises money through events such as the spring auction and the book fair. Enrichment events sponsored by the PTO include visits from the Baltimore Zoomobile, the Maryland Ballet, and the Annapolis firefighters.

The Preschool is delighted to offer parishioner preference in the admissions process for the first time this year. PASA hosts tours and Open Houses for prospective families in the fall and winter. PASA looks forward to continuing to provide Annapolis with a unique, enriching preschool program and considering ways in which it can potentially grow in its ability to serve more families in the future.

St. Anne's School of Annapolis

St. Anne's School of Annapolis, an independent Episcopal school for Twos through Eighth Grade, was founded in the tradition of Episcopal education: to value intellectual discipline, reason and wonder; to govern oneself; to live in community and to prepare for a life of purpose.

Last June, we were honored to have The Right Reverend Eugene Sutton preside over our graduation ceremony. In his remarks, he described the way in which we marry Episcopal traditions with the leading educational research and best practices from independent schools across the country to create the optimal environment for fostering academic, social, emotional and spiritual growth, "Episcopal schools are a gift to the world ... there is no barrier between having rigorous scholarly pursuit and demanding excellence of students while on the other hand maintaining faith, faith in God, faith in oneself and love for the community."

Prior to graduation, our eighth grade students complete an integrated, service-driven capstone project where they explore their own personal beliefs and examine societal issues. With this unique capstone experience and an Episcopal education as their foundation, our alumni continue to achieve academic success, play strong leadership roles, and offer meaningful services to their communities in high school and beyond.

This November, our Board of Trustees announced a bold and forward thinking plan for the school, to significantly reduce tuition to a flat rate of \$14,000 over the next three years. While independent school tuition continues to climb at schools across the nation, our Board of Trustees designed this transformative initiative to allow more children in the Annapolis-area to benefit from our exceptional program rooted in the Episcopal tradition.

This coming June will mark an important milestone in St. Anne's School history as we bid farewell to our Founding Head of School, Fran Lukens, who guided and shaped the Nursery and Kindergarten at St. Anne's Church into the thriving St. Anne's School we know today. Her long-time colleague, Associate Head of School Lisa Nagel, will assume the role of Head of School in June.

On May 19, 2012, we will co-host a Benedictine retreat day with St. Anselm's Abbey in Washington, DC.

Centering Prayer

Centering Prayer, which began at St. Anne's in 2001, meets every Monday in the Parish House Skylight Room from 7:30 to 9:00 p.m., except on holidays. The gathering, usually four to eight persons from St. Anne's and churches in other communities, does Centering Prayer for 20-30 minutes and reads and discusses books or videos on Centering Prayer or other contemplative prayer practices for daily living. On the first Monday of the month, we also pray using Lectio Divina, an ancient method of listening with the ear of our heart to Scripture, along with Centering Prayer. Carol Leach and Eileen Rizzo are co-facilitators.

Centering Prayer, a prayer practice rooted in the ancient Christian contemplative tradition, is a simple method of prayer that slows down the normal flow of thoughts so our hearts and minds are more open and receptive to God.

Emmaus

Emmaus seeks to provide a supportive and nurturing environment for listening, responding, and resting in the Spirit which is at work in us. We hope the Emmaus programs will hearten prayerful awareness of the sacred and holy in our everyday lives as reflected in scripture and modeled by Jesus. Possible offerings include the Advent Prayer Booklet, workshops, retreats, days of prayer and reflection, and the Eileen Hunt Memorial Lecture.

For the third year in a row, the annual stewardship campaign is on track to reach its goal! As of Epiphany, 2012, 391 pledges had come in for a total of \$761,861. This is an average gift of \$1,948 and heading towards our goal for 2012 of 410 pledging families and \$800,000.

In 2011, at this same time, we had achieved 356 pledging families and over \$675,000; and in 2010, 313 pledges for a total of \$641,000.

Under the fearless leadership of Jerry Chambers, the Stewardship Committee has worked since September to set goals, write copy, meet deadlines, and personally contact every parishioner who had not pledged by Thanksgiving. Many thanks to committee members who included: Bob Biddle, Kirsten Chapman, Prue Clopp, Allan Craig, Sandy Criscimagna, Karen Davis, Wendy Fredland, Debbie Houghton, David Huggins, Bruce Krause, Lori Lucas, Cary Lukens, Maggie McDowell, Margaret Moore, Bob Sherer, Molly Smith, Carolyn Sullivan and Chip Tucker. Our appreciation also goes to the office staff and Treasurer, Steve Fisher, who has kept meticulous records.

It costs more than \$2,000 a day to keep the doors of the church and parish house open. That's before we spend any money on parish programs or outreach of any sort. Your pledges allow the Vestry to put a budget in place that is fiscally responsible, keeps us "in the black," while letting us plan for future initiatives. During the year, additional monies come into St. Anne's from cash in the plate, checks from non-pledged families, and from wedding and room rental income. Like any household, it is hard to budget on what might come in so we rely heavily on pledges of which, history shows, over 90% will be honored. Thank you!

The luncheon meeting of the Altar Guild, catered by Lucky and Shaila Sachdeva, was held on February 6th, 2011. One new member joined and two members departed during the year [one retired, one deceased]. There were a total of 48 members as of December 31, 2011; seven members are inactive, leaving a total of 41 active members.

In an effort to increase our numbers, we are hosting a “Meet the Altar Guild” session in January 2012.

The Sunday and weekday services and the flower arrangements are covered by persons assigned to one of four teams which rotate on a weekly basis. All other duties are handled by persons who have a specific interest in any of the other categories, i.e. candle care, linen care, brass and silver polishing, care of kneelers, sewing and repair of linens and vestments, etc. Baptisms, weddings and funerals are now handled by a separate team under the direction of the rector.

There were 17 weddings and 16 funerals held during 2011. The weddings ranged from 50 to 200 guests. It is always a pleasure to help make these lifetime events memorable for everyone who attends. In addition, we welcomed 52 new members of Christ’s body through Baptism.

St. Anne’s is blessed to have dedicated Altar Guild members who work together in the care and adornment of the altar and the church. The Altar Guild is open to everyone. If anyone is interested in serving on this ministry, you are welcome to visit us in the Altar Guild Sacristy anytime.

Music

Music has been and continues to be the cornerstone of worship at St. Anne's. Our Senior Choirs bring more than 40 people through our doors each week as they rehearse and prepare music to support worship for two regular services each week and for special services throughout the year. This means that by the time you read this report, our choir will have sung for more than 125 services over a 12-month period. This is extraordinary for any church, but it is even more so for one of our size. Most music programs take a break in the summer. Not ours... We are there 52 weeks a year. This is possible because we have an incredibly dedicated and committed staff and an amazing group of volunteers that work together to make sure that we bring our parish the best music possible.

In addition to the things above that you see (or maybe hear is a better word), there are also things that you may not be aware of that help support music at St. Anne's. Our St. Anne’s Concert Series is a powerful means of bringing new people into our parish. This past year we changed the format of these concerts (which are free and open to the public). That, coupled with a new PR approach and time, has helped us to build the audience for these concerts from an average of 20/concert to close to 100/concert! We have gained several new choir members and parishioners whose first contact with St. Anne’s was one of these Thursday evening

concerts. They came, they liked it, and decided to make this their church home. That number represents almost 20% of our existing choir. As people move away and/or decide to do other things, it is very important to recruit new members. Our concert series not only function as good outreach activities, they also help feed our existing program so that it continues to grow.

Over the last year we have presented concerts in partnership with many groups including the United States Naval Academy, Live Arts Maryland, The Kennedy Center, and other organizations and musicians. These partnerships have helped us establish St. Anne's as a destination for people to hear great music. Our experience is that once they come, many of them come back and become a part of our community!

As we look ahead, it is my hope that we will be able to continue to build on the foundation we have built so that music will continue to be an integral part of our parish life.

The Office of Evening Prayer

This past year 2011, was one of tremendous growth for the collection of parishioners that regularly provide leadership of The Daily Office of Evening Prayer. In fact, participation of new leaders increased by over 20% for the first time in nearly 20 years, since the inception of the lay-led service by the Rev. Janice Gordon-Barnes in 1987.

Many Daily Evening Prayer leaders have been involved with The Daily Office for an average of ten to fifteen years, along with the nearly 100 plus parishioners that have been Daily Evening Prayer Leaders over the years. St. Anne's is the only parish church in Annapolis/Arundel County that offers the service six days a week all year long and seven days a week during Lent.

Presently, nearly 40 parishioners share leadership of the prayer office evenings at 5:30 p.m., with two leaders serving each evening. It is not unusual for tourists and those seeking the comfort of prayer to join our cadre at the end of day. In addition to praying for those on our parish list of sick or needy and those from St. Anne's deployed in the military, special prayer requests are honored by visitors who leave requests at St. Anne's during the day.

Although we look for continued growth of the Daily Office Prayer ministry, in the words of the late Rev. J. Winfree Smith, "It is not important how many people come to the service, but that the people of St. Anne's continue to hold the service for the parish, the city and the world."

The year ahead holds great promise as several special events are scheduled in celebration of a quarter century of offering the The Office of Evening Prayer.

Worship

Every Sunday St. Anne's Parish welcomes everyone *"to join in active participation in our worship -- hearing the Word, singing hymns, saying prayers, offering our gifts, and being nourished in Communion."* The word Worship (which is both a verb and a noun) is a very broad term concerning acts of adoration, which may be as diverse as private prayer and meditation, public corporate liturgies, or lay-lead prayer services. Christian worship, both individual and corporate, is offered through and in the name of Jesus Christ. * The responsibility for our corporate worship falls to our rector, but many people work with our clergy so that our worship together offers up our very best to God.

The past year saw the attendance at our regular Sunday worship services grow steadily. The rector's decision not to change the service schedule during the summer helped to maintain this growth. Bishop Sutton came to St. Anne's on February 27 and confirmed twenty-one young people and confirmed or received four adults into the Episcopal Church. Our observance of a Holy Lent brought us to the climax of Holy Week, and we had the opportunity to concentrate on the drama of Palm Sunday and then continue to observe Holy Week through Good Friday to a joyous Easter celebration. Throughout the summer months we welcomed guest preachers, including our seminarian, Dawn Campbell, the Rev. Canon Angela Shepherd, Dr. Stephen Fowl, and the Rt. Rev. John L. Rabb. The month of June included the popular Kirkin' o' the Tartan and baptisms on the Day of Pentecost. We observed a solemn Day of Remembrance on September 11th with prayer and music. Later in September, the Celebration in the Circle brought together our diverse community and showcased our many ministries. Our worship together in the fall included a Blessing of the Animals, All Saints' Sunday, Thanksgiving, and the Advent Sundays. All three services on Christmas Eve were festive and glorious and very crowded. The fact that Christmas Day and New Year's Day fell on Sundays required extra effort from our clergy, staff and volunteers.

Our corporate worship is vital for our growth and health as a church. It would never happen without the help of many faithful volunteers who help regularly on Sundays as well as volunteer for wedding and funeral services to help support our worship life together at St. Anne's.

REPORT OF THE TREASURER

2011 was a contrast of some favorable areas and some less favorable ones for the Parish. Please reference the Statement of Activities as you follow the notes below. The church is one corporation but we track our operations in four divisions to facilitate understanding and improve our ability to manage them. *Please note all results are preliminary and unaudited.*

Church:

We had a very successful finish to the 2011 year. December Giving was \$104,000 which was \$12,000 higher than last December and \$8,200 higher than budget. For the year, we had a surplus of \$70,488. Our very favorable results were the result of strong and generous giving which came in at \$34,000 higher than budget and up 4.5% over 2010. Pledge Giving for 2011 was \$671,000 which was 9% higher than 2010. Expenses were up 2.6% over 2010. In our restricted funds, we had income of \$168,000. Restricted fund expenses were \$177,000 including \$93,000 that were outreach related and \$42,000 for the parish nurse ministry.

Cemetery:

The Cemetery had a poor year with a net loss of \$(19,648). Lot sales and fees were well below budget, and even though expenses were better than budget, the loss was substantial. If it were a standalone company, the cemetery would be nearing insolvency, although it has a substantial endowment. The endowment, or perpetual care fund as it is called in the business, is \$645,000 but this does not spin off enough money to fund the cemetery's expenses. The Vestry has begun discussion and will form a committee to look into structural changes that can be implemented to help the Cemetery over the longer term.

PASA:

The Preschool for the Arts had a loss of \$(23,704). \$3,000 of the loss is related to the PTO whose results are consolidated with the school and not a concern. The remainder is related to some 2011-2012 student losses which have occurred early in the year and to some front loaded spending for new school supplies. These lost months cannot be easily recaptured. A recovery plan has been prepared and will help improve results during the 2012 portion of the school year.

Endowment:

The Endowment benefitted from \$107,000 of donations and bequests from planned giving. Investment results were only about \$6,500, although this was not out of line with the market performance in general. The Endowment distributed a net of \$138,844 to the General Fund, Restricted Funds and Cemetery and realized a net loss of \$(68,895) for the year. The Endowment had an invested balance of \$3.4 million which is managed by the Investment Committee through our investment adviser, Merrill Lynch.

Consolidated:

The combined results for the St. Anne's for the year was a loss of \$(35,879) driven largely by the poor results from the Endowment, Cemetery, and Preschool. For the operating parts of the church (General Fund, Cemetery, and Preschool), Detailed financial statements are available upon request and the audited statements for 2011 will be available upon completion of the audit by Davis Josey Keating Rains, LLC in the late summer time frame.
