Patient Trust in Ourselves and the Slow Work of God

Above all, trust in the slow work of God.

We are quite naturally impatient in everything to reach the end without delay.

We would like to skip the intermediate stages.

We are impatient of being on the way to something unknown, something new.

And yet, it is the law of all progress that it is made by passing through stages of instability – and that it may take a very long time.

And so I think it is with us; ideas mature gradually – let them grow, let them shape themselves, without undue haste.

Don't try to force them on, as though we could be today what time (that is to say, grace and circumstances acting on our own good will) will make of us tomorrow.

Only God can say what this new spirit gradually forming in us will be.

We are given the benefit of believing that God is leading us, and accept the anticipation of feeling ourselves in suspense and incomplete.
